Depending on your child's condition, the tracheostomy may or may not be permanent. Your child needs a trach for one of these reasons: airway problems airway malacia (soft windpipe) airway needs to be on the ventilator (breathing machine) for a long time other: At first you will not be able to hear your child cry or talk with the trach tube in place.
