Totally Wired is the first inside guide to what teens are really doing on the Internet and with technology today. Author Anastasia Goodstein creates an informative and accessible guide that covers topics such as social networking, blogging, cyberbullying, and much, much more. Including interviews with a cross section of industry professionals and teenagers, and loaded with fascinating statistics and revealing anecdotes, Totally Wired is the first guide that explains to parents in easy-to-understand terms what kids are really up to online, and arms parents with the knowledge they need to promote This looks like Cybershock: Totally Wired, by David Lambert (1996). Amazon's summary: When Jed is accidentally electrocuted while working on his computer, he's amazed to discover that the computer images no longer appear on the burned-out CRT but instead appear inside his head. Even more amazing, he discovers that by thinking commands, he can operate his computer remotely. Jed's incredible new power brings him to a head-to-head confrontation with a crazed gunman—and himself. There does not seem to be a cover image I can find online, even though the book was apparently scanned. In Totally Wired, Goodstein has written a superb book. If you are a parent and you have a teenager, please read this book. When totally wired teenagers today get out of bed in the morning, the first thing they do--before breakfast and before showering--is to fire-up their "at rest" computer to check for messages on their favorite community sites. Totally wired teenagers will call or text their friends on the way to school so they know where they are and where to meet them when they arrive. To protect themselves from having their cell phones confiscated during classes, they turn them to vibrate, but they use them between classes to keep in touch with their friends and plan activities for immediately after school.
