"File on the Tsar," by Anthony Summers and Tom Mangold, assails the account, generally accepted by historians, that Russia's last Emperor, Nicholas II, his wife and five children were massacred by Bolshevik executioners on July 16, 1918 in the Siberian town of Ekaterinburg. In making their case, the two English authors rely on the technique of "investigative journalism." The ultimate verdict on the book's theme, and implicitly on the book itself, was rendered by our inimitable Secretary of State. Through an unidentified third person the authors approached Henry Kissinger while the latter was flying in the special mission plane somewhere over North Africa in search of Middle East peace.
